WASHINGTON OAK AND THE USS CONSTITUTION


Thanks to the inquisitive natures of members Ben & Shirley Thompson, and the pursuit of Guale President John Christian, the mystery of "What happened to that piece of the Washington Oak?" has been solved.

To review a bit - the historic Washington Oak was planted with much ceremony in the middle of Osborne Street in St. Marys the day that George Washington was buried. It finally succumbed to age and civilized forces such as surrounding pavement, and because of danger to passing motorists it was cut down in 1987. With the cooperation of City Fathers and local Navy Officials, portions of it were then shipped to the Charlestown, Massachusetts Navy Yard to be used in ongoing repairs to that venerable frigate USS CONSTITUTION a/k/a OLD IRONSIDES. (Incidentally, most of the original timbers in this world's oldest commissioned warship launched in 1797 came from Georgia's barrier islands.)

On a summer visit to the ship's museum, the Thompsons noted that Georgia was not named among the states providing timber for the ship's repairs. A letter from Dr. Christian to the Maintenance and Repair Facility followed.

Facility Director C.M. Deans replied explaining that "...gracious donations of live oak, such as that from St. Marys is of
tremendous benefit to the ship's maintenance and repair effort..." and repairs have indeed been made from the Washington Oak timber. He also expressed appreciation for the interest
shown in the ship's preservation and assured that the sign
listing states providing oak would be corrected to include
Georgia. If you will note the accompanying picture supplied
by Mr. Deans, the forward starboard pin rail next to the webbed
opening is "ours" (for us landlubbers, that is the short curved
timber a couple of feet above the deck.)

Thus Camden County live oak remains afloat in the USS Constitution.

McINTOSH TABBY RUINS

Marjorie Waters on behalf of Guale Historical Society has now placed in the hands of Camden Recreation Department, that oversees the ruins, a bronze plaque showing that the ruins have been placed on the National Register of Historic Places, Recreation department head Jimmy Gisi has assured the Society that the plaque will be securely mounted as soon as possible.

FROM BRYAN-LANG LIBRARY

A new computer is among the possessions of the library with the genealogical program Brother's Keeper among the programs installed. Also purchased were the index to the 1860 Florida census, Early Georgia Marriages Before 1800, and also those after 1800. Library volunteer Larry Durbin has also placed many families he has researched, including Camden family Sheffield, and Camden County cemeteries in the computer making them readily available to researchers.

A new copier has also been ordered and should be installed by the time you receive your newsletter.

FROM OTHER ORGANIZATIONS

From the newsletter of the Historic Advisory Committee of the Altamaha RDC: This will be of interest to those with Wayne County connections. In November 1992, a dedication ceremony was held at Doctortown on the Altamaha River for a marker commerating the Indian, Civil War and lumber industry heritage associated with the site. This point on the river was a major crossing point from Indian days through WWII. It was a target of Union troops in 1864, and later became an industrial center for the timber and paper industry. The village of Doctortown has disappeared, but the historic site now has state recognition.

Although not a Camden resident, Midge has a special feel for historic Camden developed through her research on local ancestors.
