# LET'S RAMBLE TO WAYCROSS OKEFENOKEE HERITAGE CENTER WAYCROSS: GATEWAY TO THE WORLD FAMOUS OKEFENOKEE

Saturday October 22. Details: Meet at the old Winn Dixie across from the Methodist Church in Kingsland. 8:30 SHARP!

Brief business session at 8:00, then depart after report from nominating committee.

This will be a morning tour about 1 or 2 hours, group fee is \$1.50 per person. Group may then lunch (Dutch treat) at Shoney's or your choice. Afternoon free for other sites, on your own, suggestions follow. Will see you there!

### OKEFENOKEE HERITAGE CENTER

This museum depicting the heritage and life of people living in and around the Okefenokee is located in Waycross between Corrider Z and US 1. Here you can study south Georgia Indians, step inside an 1840s frontier cabin, see the early machines of printing, climb aboard old railroad cars, ramble through and authentic depot, and learn even more about this area's history.

Those of you familiar with pioneer south Georgia families have only to glance through the nine volume set of Huxford's Pioneers of Wiregrass Georgia to realize that Ware County and Camden County families and histories are closely allied. Visiting this area will make you even more aware of this connection.

A suggestion for even more - right next door, but not included in tour, you will find the Southern Forest World, an educational exhibit center designed to tell the story of southeast Georgia's most important industry - forestry. Here you can learn about naval stores operations, the impact of the forest industry, understand forest management or more bizarre, see a mummified dog captured in a tree.

The surroundings of these two centers are quiet, tree shaded, beautifully landscaped, and you can choose the amount of walking you might want to do. US 1 between Folkston and Waycross is now four lane, with wildflowers blooming in force attracting thousands of yellow butterflies. So these crisp fall days bring promise of an easy colorful drive, and congenial companions offer an outstanding day. Ya'll come!!

### OTHER SITES TO VISIT NEAR WAYCROSS

If you want to have a full day of sight-seeing these are among stops you might want to make after lunch:

Baptist Village, a retirement center on Carswell Avenue is located on the site of the old Hillard Plantation. (His old house is the one on display at the Heritage Center.) Here the spacious pecan grove grounds are quiet, the buildings attractive, and seeing the third largest of Georgia's documented liveoak tree measuring 30½ feet in circumference will make this an interesting drive-through.

Nearby is Waycross's oldest cemetery, Kettle Creek. This is on an old stagecoach route terminating in St. Marys and dating to early settlement days when Indians still roamed the woods and every able bodied man enlisted in the local militia to defend the settlers. Obadiah Barber, "King of the Okefeno-kee" or "Bear Hunter King" is buried here. You will also see the gravestones of the Hilliards, Millers, Jeffords, Sweats, Thigpen, MacDonald and other families prominent in south Georgia history.

The Obadiah Barber entrance to the Okefenokee is a more recent addition to the Ware County attractions and this is located 8½ miles from town with a boardwalk and an 1800 homestead.

The more familiar Okefenokee entrance is ten miles south of Waycross with boat rides, slide presentations, animal displays and more.

So come on along and bring a guest for a full day of fun and fellowship.

### SNIPPETS FROM ORANGE HALL

St. Marys merchants will be having their annual open house on November 1, from 5-9pm. Local artist Tess Sheffield will be signing numbered prints of her "The Music Room" watercolor at Spencer House. The original work will be on display at this time.

In 1993 the music room at Orange Hall was dedicated to Mrs. Dot Barker who had been instrumental in restoring Orange Hall and who had given the antique piano on display there. After her death, Mrs. Sheffield painted this watercolor as a tribute to her. This scene will be used on the advertisements for the Christmas Tour of Homes. You will probably want to be early for the signing on November 1, since her 1993 "Christmas at Orange Hall" sold immediately.

Orange Hall has a new addition. A three tiered fountain that enhances its front yard. It gives the appearance of having been there always. Thank you Orange Hall committee for even more beauty at the "Grande Dame" of St. Marys historical buildings.

St. Marys Elementary student Eric Green won first place in the recent Orange Hall art contest. His entry has been reproduced on t-shirts that are now available at Orange Hall for \$10.

The Orange Hall committee asks your continued support of the structure's ongoing restoration. You may do this by attending the Christmas Tour of Homes on Saturday, December 17.
