GENEALOGY CORNER - Robert Frohock

This information was supplied by Historical Society member Jacquelyn Biggane and appears in September 1997 Huxford Genealogical Society Magazine. Jackie has since made corrections to the magazine and this writing reflects her corrections. Other material comes from Vocelle's HISTORY OF CAMDEN COUNTY.



Robert H. Frohock

J. Robert H. Frohock was born August 11, 1844 in McIntosh County, the son of Charles and Sarah Clubb Frohock. When Robert was six years old, his father moved the family back to its old home on Cumberland Island.

He attended school in Brunswick. During the Civil War he enlisted in the Brunswick Rifles. After sixty days, this unit was reorganized as Co. A (later Co. K) of the 26th Ga. Regt. He filed an application for discharge on October 31, 1861 while on disability leave. After the war he was a major in the United Confederate Veterans.

He was a member of the State Legislature in 1911-12 and again in 1916, In Camden County, he served as Superintendent of Public Roads, County Ordinary (today's probate judge), a member of the Board of Education, and justice of the peace of the 29th District. He was postmaster and commander of the Kingsland Lodge of Knights of Pythia.

James Vocelle described him as being "... an important factor in county politics and honored in his county with many positions of honor and trust. He has always served his people faithfully and well and enjoys their confidence and esteem. Judge Frohock is a Christian gentleman of the real old Southern type and his life has been one of useful service to his fellow man."

In the late 1800s, he deeded land in the Cherry Point area near his home to the Methodist Church. The Cherry Point Methodist Church was built there and was in use until the early 20s. The property then reverted to the Frohock estate.

In 1864, Mr. Frohock married Margaret Harriet Pacetti, the daughter of John and Margaret Campbell Pacetti. He died March 4, 1928. She died April 25, 1924. Both are buried in Oak Grove Cemetery in St. Marys.

Historical Society member Mary Bullard's ROBERT STAFFORD OF CUMBERLAND ISLAND GROWTH OF A PLANTER is fast becoming the opera ZABETTE with the music by Georgia born composer Curtis Bryant of Georgia State University and libretto by historian Mary Bullard.

Mrs. Bullard briefly describes the opera in a letter to Friends of Cumberland Island "She was born on Jekyll. He was born on Cumberland. Their children were born on a cotton plantation called Stafford. Her father and grandmother lie buried at Plum Orchard Plantation. Sound like a guided tour?

"No, it is the scenario for ZABETTE, an opera in three acts, based upon the true life story in Camden County, of two Cumberland Islanders, planter Robert Stafford and Elizabette, born a slave...."

A student premiere is planned for spring 1998 in Atlanta. Its producer is W. Dwight Coleman, who chairs opera studies at Georgia State University. Private sources are funding this project and additional funds are needed to see the project completed.

FROM BRYAN-LANG HISTORICAL, LIBRARY
