
COME RAMBLE!!! SATURDAY, SEPTEMBER 18 FORT CAROLINE CALLS!!!

Meet at 10 A.M. - Old Winn Dixie parking lot in Kingsland, next to United Methodist Church.

Read on for more details - Program Chairman Henry Williams has once again lined up a trip you will want to be a part of!

After leaving at 10 sharp, the group will travel over to Regency Square via Dame's Point Bridge to have an early Dutch Treat lunch at Piccadilly Cafeteria, then on to the nearby fort! No entrance fee!

A ranger guided tour will begin promptly at 1:00. Besides this tour, you may also take a self-guided historical tour and spend awhile in the museum. Included in the display are Timucuan artifacts, and copies of the Jacque le Moyne drawings which depict the lives of these early Indians, who once made Camden County home.

MORE ABOUT FORT CAROLINE

Fort Caroline National Monument located on a bluff on the south bank of the St. Johns River is the site reputedly where Jean Ribault landed in 1562 with plans to establish a New France. Here he erected a stone marker symbolizing French ownership.

Two years later in June 1564, the French built Fort Caroline to defend their settlement of French Huguenots and their claim to the new world. In September, only three months later, St. Augustine founder Pedro Menendez marched overland during a hurricane and captured the fort.

REPRINTING THE COUNTY HISTORY

Peggy Aronson, who is updating Camden's Challenge for re-publication, announces that work is moving quite well. It should reach the printer by mid-December and be on sale in January. Many families have updated their 1976 histories and about two hundred new ones submitted theirs before the deadline. WOODBINE CENTENNIAL

Christmas Day 1893 - the first train came through Camden County marking the beginning of new towns to grow along the tracks, Woodbine, which would later become Camden's seat of government, among them. Regular service began in January. Now Woodbine is planning a celebration to end all celebrations - in fact, a full year of activity.

First of all - here is how you may help. If you have early photos to lend for the proposed photo display, please take by the Bryan-Lang Library to Dr. Christian who is chairman for the Centennial Celebration.

One successful activity has already taken place, an evening of reminiscences of older Woodbine citizens - who shared their experiences of long gone days. These will be incorporated into a booklet to be printed during the year.

Put this down as a MUST ATTEND - Woodbine Homecoming on November 13. This will be a covered dish dinner, place to be announced.

In December city church choirs will combine voices for an evening of Christmas music at city hall, as well as the lighting of the city Christmas tree.

Among other events in the coming year are a womanless wedding and a pageant giving the history of Woodbine. So look ahead to all these great events!
